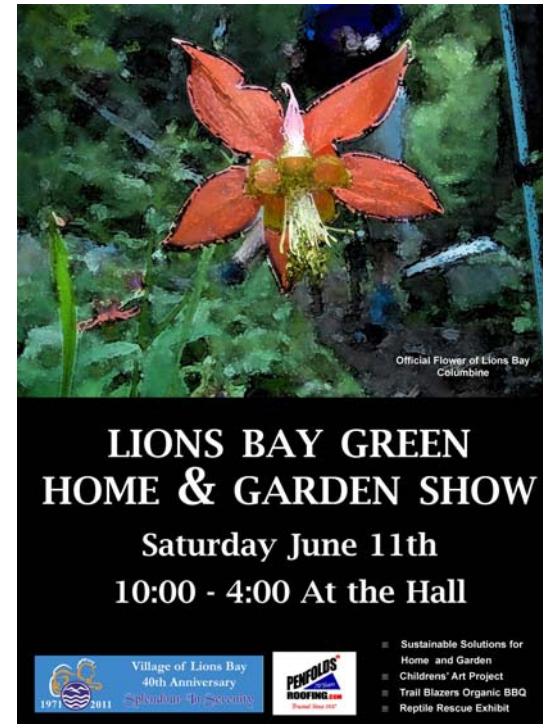

TREE POLICY

At the Council meeting of May 16th, 2011, Council approved a revised Policy regarding Tree Management on Private Land, to replace the former policy, which needed revision. The original policy created in 2002 was guided by the Official Community Plan which has references related to trees.

The revised Tree Policy regarding Tree Management on Private Land clarifies the role of Council, the Municipality and the Tree Committee. It makes clear that concerns related to trees between two private property owners is a matter between those two parties only. They can, however, if they wish, seek advice from the Tree Committee on how best to deal with the trees.

The Tree Committee is a select committee of Council and it consists of four residents, plus one Council member. It is established under the Tree Bylaw #393 which governs Tree Management on municipal (not

private) land. The purpose of the Tree Committee is to act in an advisory capacity to Council on matters related to the development, interpretation, enforcement and future direction of tree management in the Village of Lions Bay. It is the first point

of reference for Tree Cutting Permit applications under the Tree Bylaw, and is expected to provide balanced and objective advice to Council on these applications. The appointments are for a three-year term.

While the Tree Committee members will offer advice to residents, it administers the Tree Bylaw only with respect to municipal lands. In very limited circumstances when safety is involved, Council has powers to take remedial action with a tree on private land under the Community Charter. The Policy on Tree Management on

Private Land references this.

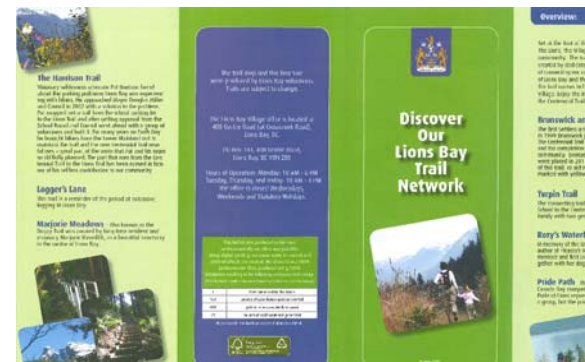
SPEEDWATCH STARTS OFF WITH SUCCESS

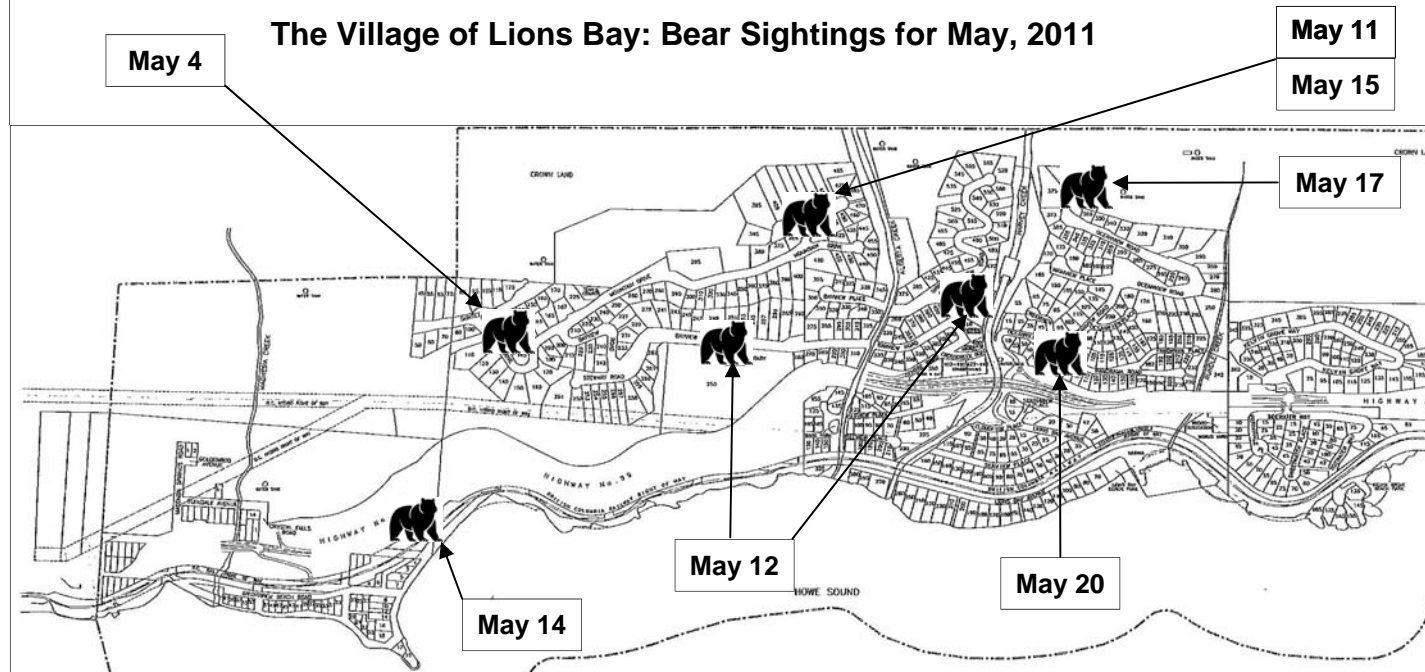


VILLAGE OF LIONS BAY TRAIL MAPS AVAILABLE

BEAR-LY AN ISSUE

Shhh, did you hear that? It was the sound of a bear shuffling through the forest. Didn't hear it? Doesn't mean it didn't happen.

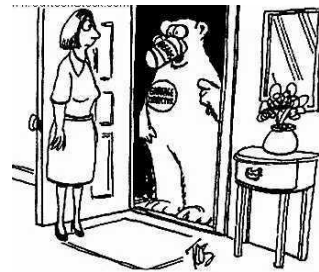
Just because you don't hear a bear, or see a bear, doesn't mean that you aren't on a bear's radar. And if that bear happens to get whiff of last night's delicious fish casserole, be forewarned, the building that houses your garbage is just an extra layer of food packaging, like the insulation sleeve around a pizza box.

Be careful where you store your garbage. If you don't have a wildlife-resistant bin - like the Rollins Schaeffer bins sold by the Village Office - storage in your garage is a better option than an outdoor shed. You could also freeze meat and fish waste until garbage day, but make sure that waste is clearly marked as such, otherwise a family member might mistake that for a container of leftovers.

Or, perhaps, think about investing in a wildlife-resistant bin. Wildlife-resistant bins are not foolproof but chances are that a bear will bat about the bin but not actually be able to open this Rubik's cube!

Think of a bear as a motivated creature that likes a good challenge. Why not give it one by storing your garbage securely or by putting your garbage in an appropriate container.

Consider yourself bear-warned.

BEAR CAVEAT

Please remember that failure to secure house wildlife attractants will result in a \$300 fine.

ZERO WASTE CHALLENGE REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

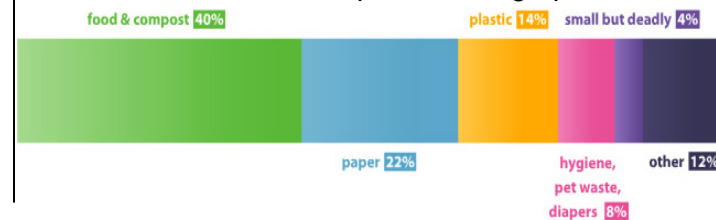
Solid Waste Disposal is going to change throughout the Metro Region. Food/Kitchen Scraps and Green/Yard Trimmings Waste will go to a composting facility. Composting has a 2011 tipping fee of **\$63/tonne**, versus the Landfill tipping fee of **\$97/tonne**. A **\$34/tonne** difference. The Village of Lions Bay Council has given Solid Waste a serious consideration over this term of office. Solid Waste is a growing cost to residents. The Village of Lions Bay Council is interested in providing Village residents with information on how to reduce, reuse and recycle.

**Please attend the Lions Bay Green Show
~ Saturday, June 11th from 10am to 4pm ~
The Metro Vancouver Zero Waste Challenge team
will be on-site to respond to your questions and
to provide information.**

Clean, untreated wood waste will also be accepted at the green waste tipping fee of **\$63 per tonne**, because it can also be composted or used as a resource. There is no tipping Fee for Loads of Source-Separated Recyclables deposited at Recycling Areas designated for such materials, substances and objects. The Zero Waste Challenge is about reducing our waste and understanding that it now goes to the landfill.

Use MetroVancouverRecycles, an online searchable database that can help you reuse or recycle 100's of items. Today, thanks to recycling and reusing, more than half (55%) of the 3.6 million tonnes of waste Metro creates every year, is kept out of the garbage.

Try doing a Waste Audit with your family :
Look what's in your trash. Ask how you ended up with it.? How does it compare to this graph?

Owners of dogs at large are liable for a fine of up to \$75.00

PESTICIDES

Many people use pesticides on their lawns and gardens as a first line of defence against unwanted pests. But chemical pesticides are no longer our only choice - nor our best choice in most cases. By working *with* nature rather than against it, we can have a beautiful garden as well as a healthier family and neighbourhood.

Across Canada, the cosmetic use of pesticides (i.e. for use on lawns and flower gardens) is much greater on a per-acre measure than even agricultural use of pesticides. Council responded to concerns about the risks to human health, ecological integrity and biodiversity associated with the use of pesticides by passing Pesticides Bylaw 430.

HOW COMPOSTING YOUR FOOD SCRAPS WILL HELP SAVE THE WORLD

Why should you compost your food scraps?

Because leftovers that end up in the dump create greenhouse gases.

Here's what's happening:

Greenhouse gases act like a giant blanket that surrounds our planet, trapping some of the sun's energy. So how did we end up with all these greenhouse gases?

A big part of the problem is the result of burning fossil fuels like gas and oil. Those fossil fuels are long-buried remnants of plants and dinosaurs that covered the Earth millions of years ago. When we burn those fossil fuels, we're releasing carbon dioxide that was trapped underground all that time.

All those carbon dioxide molecules we're releasing are absorbing heat bouncing off of the Earth's surface and re-radiating that heat into our biosphere - that super-thin layer that supports all life on Earth - instead of letting it escape into outer space like it's supposed to. That's why global temperatures have increased to the point that our polar ice caps are melting.

So how can composting help save the world?

As plants grow, they absorb carbon dioxide from the air. When those same plants die they release that carbon dioxide back into the atmosphere. This "carbon cycle" doesn't add any new greenhouse gases to the atmosphere.

But here is the problem. If the plants get buried and decompose without oxygen, instead of creating carbon dioxide they create methane. Methane is about 20 times more potent than carbon dioxide when it comes to absorbing the heat bouncing off of

the Earth's surface. And two-thirds of the methane produced in Metro Vancouver is from food and plant material rotting in the dump.

That's why municipalities throughout the Metro Vancouver region will be collecting everyone's food scraps by 2015. Food scraps, including those from cooking and mealtime left overs, are taken to facilities where composting takes place at a high enough temperature to break down meat, bones, pizza boxes and dairy products. All of your food scraps are then returned to the soil in the form of nutrient-rich compost.

Try to compost your fruit and vegetable scraps in a backyard composter.

Or if your house is in Burnaby, Coquitlam, New Westminister, Port Coquitlam, Port Moody or Richmond, you can already put all of your food scraps in your green yard trimmings cart.

It starts with you. By separating your food scraps from the garbage and placing them in your green totes you're helping your municipality reduce garbage volumes going to the dump. Your municipality takes your food scraps and yard trimmings to a large-scale composting facility in Richmond, where it is transformed into soil and mulch products for gardens and parks. Your food scraps won't get buried in a dump and start generating methane, that powerful greenhouse gas that accelerates global warming.

That's how separating all of your food scraps for composting will help save the world. Return those organics to the Earth as soil, not as methane.

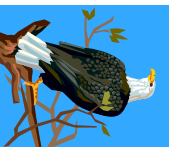
TEMPORARY SUMMER POSITION

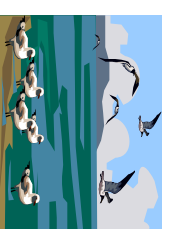
